# <u>That Which Sustains Us explores how Culture has shaped our</u> <u>relationships to Forests and the Natural Environment in Vancouver</u>

# MOV's newest long-term exhibition opens to the public on June 3, 2021

VANCOUVER, BC – On June 3, 2021, the upcoming long-term exhibition **That Which Sustains Us** opens to the public at the **Museum of Vancouver (MOV).** Situated within the Vancouver Stories galleries, **That Which Sustains Us** will tell the story of Vancouver's forests and natural environments through a unique and non-linear narrative. The curatorial collective behind the project included Musqueam, Squamish, and Tseil-Waututh Nation cultural experts, environmental historians, and forestry researchers, facilitated by Sharon Fortney, MOV's Curator of Indigenous Collections and Engagement. The City of Vancouver's Green Infrastructure team also supported the project with expertise on Climate change and strategies for improving water quality and increasing biodiversity within our city.

"This exhibition is a departure. It disrupts the traditional linear narrative of MOV's Vancouver Stories Galleries which currently follow a timeline approach to telling history. Instead, we are deconstructing colonial narratives by employing a thematic approach to history that is not only about our past, but our present, and the future. We move beyond the colonial violence of land clearing and urbanization, to explore our current climate emergency, and examine ways we can increase biodiversity and return nature to our city. This exhibition will be the first in a series of exhibitions that will relaunch MOV's Vancouver Stories galleries in a new direction." -- Dr. Sharon Fortney, MOV Curator of Indigenous Collections and Engagement

By exploring different knowledge traditions in the Vancouver area and how they intersect, the exhibition examines the life of forests through the interconnected lenses of Land and Water, Food, Movement, Economy, Home, and Story. By posing questions that relate to arboreal intelligence, the relationship between trees and water quality, and self-reflection, alongside stories of industrial violence and land stewardship, **That Which Sustains Us** weaves together these related threads to challenge visitors to consider how they can contribute to regreening our city.

Design plays a central role in conveying these abstract and non-linear narratives about the natural environment. Chad Manley of CMPLBA and Daniel Irving of Principal Architecture are the design team behind this innovative exhibition. Using a diversity of wood and paper elements they challenge visitors to consider the importance of forest resources in all areas of daily life. In keeping with MOV's focus on the Green Economy, the MOV Fabrication Team, led by Josh Doherty, used recycled and reclaimed products were used whenever possible.

**That Which Sustains Us** also features local artists, outdoor educators, and scientists. Short films, created for the project, delve into the revival of ancient forest traditions like using tree bark tannins for creating fish skin leather and the foraging of mushroom and other plants to create natural dyes for weaving. "I am honored and excited to be featured in a short documentary about my work with fish leather in this important and impactful exhibition project," says Janey Chang,

The museum is open to the public with new measures in place to ensure the health and safety of its visitors and staff. Visitors to **That Which Sustains Us** will have the opportunity to interact with these concepts, learn from diverse set of knowledge holders from a variety of local cultures, and discover how our daily lives are shaped by the natural world in countless ways.
